Lymm High introduced the 'John Berry Award for Exceptional Service' in honour of a much-loved colleague and friend who sadly passed away in May 2021. John Berry was our site supervisor and had worked at the school for well over 10 years. He was a hugely significant figure within our school community. His warmth, good humour, kindness and capacity for hard work made him very popular with colleagues.

This year's winner of the John Berry Award was Anne Mogey from Student Services. Speaking at the presentation in October 2022, Gwyn Williams said that Anne consistently went above and beyond in her work with students and that nothing was ever too much trouble. Ruth Ball, Head of Safeguarding, said that "Anne was the glue that held Student Services together".

SUMMER OF SUCCESS



It's hardly surprising that our A' Level students had high levels of nerves prior to receiving their results this summer.

Not only did the 2021–2022
Year 13 students have two years of Covid disruption, they hadn't sat public examinations since their SATs in Year 6 at Primary School. This year group was the cohort that were unable to sit their GCSE exams in 2020. As such, it was especially satisfying to see such a superb stream of results and lots of happy faces at Lymm High on Thursday 18th August.

Like-for-like, the results were even better than the excellent ones we were getting before the pandemic hit.

Almost all students have confirmed places at the universities of their choice. This includes very high numbers going to the prestigious Russell Group universities. Others have won much sought-after apprenticeships.

"It's important to stress how proud we are of *all* the students in this year group and just how many individual challenges were met", said Mr Williams.

"Lymm High is one of the very highest performing schools in the North West and indeed the whole country."

"They have worked so hard and showed so much resilience, maturity and good humour throughout the last couple of years that they thoroughly deserve all the success they have had. I am just so proud of all of

them, as indeed I am of the staff who have worked so hard to help make all this happen."

Following the tremendous success of the Year 13 students. Year 11's GCSE results were equally as impressive. We are trying to be modest and are waiting for the official government data to be published in October before we share too much with parents. However, we expect this data to confirm that Lymm High is one of the very highest performing schools in the North West and indeed the whole country. To give just one statistic for now, over 49% of <u>all</u> GCSE grades were at 9–7 (i.e., the old A^*-A).

More information on our exam results will be shared once the official DfE data is released later this autumn.

IMAGINING PEACE

Lymm High students have recorded a song to help support the Ukraine Crisis Appeal. Dr McCombs explains how the track came about.

As the tragic events in Ukraine began to unfold at the end of February Mrs Richards suggested, well actually insisted, that we do something to support the Ukraine Crisis Appeal. So, on March 9th, Mr Gornall and I spent the day with 11 Year 8 Students to record a song, the proceeds of which would go directly to that appeal.

The song we chose was *Imagine* by John Lennon, from 1971, which is very famous for its pacifist message. Lennon is asking us to envisage a place where the things that divide us, like religion

and possessions, did not exist. It is a strong political message wrapped up in a beautiful melody. John Lennon must have realised that the softer approach would allow a wider audience to

listen to his message: If you want peace, first you must imagine it.

Recording a song can be a long process, and an arduous one. Mr Gornall was re-

sponsible for the technical side of things - not just recording the sound but making sure it sounded like we were in a beautiful space, not Mr Starkey's classroom. We made the instrument tracks digitally, with a combination of Mr Gornall and I playing in and programming the sounds in an audio processing software. After that we were ready for the students to sing. They sounded fantastic, which is especially admirable given that they learned the song and its harmonies only 1 hour before they began to record the track.

We're very proud of the track we were able to produce and so we shared the track with our colleagues at World Class Schools, who said: What a brilliant initiative, and a well-deserved nomination, we're delighted to put your students forward for our character award (Maria Georgiou, Project Manager, World Class Schools).

We were runners up for that award, and

since then the song has been shared across all of the World Class Schools media platforms. It's also been played a number of times on Lymm Radio, who are also really impressed by the song.

There's still time to stream the song on Spotify, Apple Music, or

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YouTube, with money going to the appeal every single time you listen to the track.

Supplies for Ukraine

When news of the Ukraine attacks broke, staff and students within the school began to consider what support could be offered to those in need. Several students suggested donations of helpful items would be preferable such as clothes, food and medical supplies. We thought the donation of these items would resonate more with students as they could see exactly what support was being given. We contacted several Polish aid organisations in the local area but unfortunately their donation centres were already at capacity. We were then given a contact of a Ukrainian lady who had successfully set up a charity in Manchester. Over the past few months we have developed a relationship with Oksanna and her fabulous charity.

Oksanna also came into school to film a video with our Sixth Form media students. This video was then shown in assemblies to illustrate to students what had happened to their donations and how our school has been part of a much wider collaboration to support Ukraine.

PERFORMING ARTS CENTRE UPDATE

There has been a fantastic response from the community to the launch plans for a new centre for the performing arts in Lymm.

Many groups who would use the centre have been getting behind the project. Lymm High Governor Kieran Walshe, who chairs the Lymm Performing Arts Working Group, said: "We've had great support from groups and individuals from the outset and throughout our com-

munity consultation last year, but we were blown away by the response to the launch, on social media and in person."

Funding for the centre is now part of Warrington South's £3.4 million Levelling Up bid to central government. "This bid is crucial to getting this new facili-

ty for Lymm and we are delighted with the support we have had from both the council and from Andy Carter MP, as well as Lymm Parish Council, Lymm Festival and lots of local performance groups", said Kieran.

The result of the Levelling Up bid should be announced in the



next few weeks.
If successful, the
Lymm Performing
Arts Working
Group will be
seeking funding
from other fundraising sources.

The plans for the new centre envisage a purposebuilt facility on the Lymm High School site, to be used by all schools and the



community. It will have a large, professionally equipped performance hall which can be used for big events such as school productions, dance shows, concerts, Lymm Festival events, music gigs, and even touring companies and shows.

School's last production of the musical *Grease* (see p.12) showcased the talent at Lymm High which will benefit from the project.

WELLBEING CHAMPS

Year 8 students have been appointed as this year's 'Wellbeing Champions'.

Year 8 students were asked to apply for the role at the start of the academic year. This role will help to raise awareness of the importance of pupil wellbeing across the school community, in particular focusing on reducing the stigma around mental health difficulties for young people.

The group will receive training from Warrington Public Health Team and will work alongside staff members Mrs Hunter (Mental Health Lead) and Miss Newton (Mental Health and Wellbeing Manager) to deliver a series of wellbeing campaigns throughout the year.

In previous years, our group has visited local primary schools to raise awareness, this year we hope to similarly work within our local community to support positive wellbeing messages from the transition to high school through to the Sixth Form.

Our Sixth Form Wellbeing Reps have also been appointed and will work closely with the lower school team. We look forward to seeing the fantastic work of the team and sharing it through the newsletter

The first event that the team worked on was 'Hello Yellow'. An initiative from the mental health group Young Minds in support of 'World Mental Health Day'. Staff and students were asked to try and swap an item of their uniform and wear something yellow to raise awareness for young people's mental health. The event was a huge success and will now be repeated every year at Lymm High School.
