On Tuesday 11th July, a group of students spent the morning at Cheshire Grange.

Working with the residents, our students got their creative juices flowing creating a piece of art to reflect the Lymm area. They used specially made stencils, created by our Art department, which depicted local landmarks. There were also lots of floral and water-based stencils so they could create their own 'Lymm scene'.

The colourful canvases can be seen on page 8 and were on display at Lymm High's Founders' Day church service on Wednesday 19th July. They will now be displayed in school to remind staff and students of our important links with the community.

Upstairs on the 'Dementia Floor', the students were given a really poignant, insightful overview of dementia and what it's like for those living with it. They were informed about how it occurs, and how it can affect people in different ways. They were also explained the value of a routine to people with dementia. The students were so respectful and listened intently throughout, asking really thoughtful questions.

Mrs Edge and Miss Carrington accompanied the students and were really quite moved with how well the young people interacted with the residents. The care home staff also commented on how caring the Lymm High students were and said they were a credit to the school.

Please see below for a message from Kieran Walshe (Chair of the Lymm Grammar School Trust) about Ty'n-y-felin ('Tynny'). As things stand, we plan on reopening Tynny next year, but you will see from Dr Walshe's message that it is becoming increasingly challenging to operate Tynny in the way we have done hitherto. If anyone would like to contribute to our idea gathering, as mentioned below, please email alumni@lymmhigh.org.uk.

The Lymm Grammar School Trust, which owns Ty'n-yfelin on Anglesey, and Lymm High School which has operated it for many years, have been discussing the future options for Ty'ny-felin.

Ty'n-y-felin has been used

by the school and some other community groups for many years for outdoor learning and activities and occupies a very special place in the hearts of many current and past students, teachers, parents and others. Not many schools have their own residential outdoor learning centre.

But use of Ty'n-y-felin by both the school and other groups has slowly declined over recent years for all sorts of reasons – the costs and complexity of running school trips, the costs of transport to and from Anglesey, and competition from other, often larger and better equipped outdoor learning centres. Quite a few similar centres in north Wales have closed down. It has also got harder to run Ty'ny-felin from the school in Lymm – staffing it, dealing with users, providing residential services like laundry and catering, and so on.

The COVID pandemic was a particular blow for Ty'n-y-

felin – it closed in March 2020, and has not yet reopened, in part because being out of use for an extended period means there is quite a bit of maintenance needed to bring it back into use. During the closed period, the school has borne the costs of running Ty'n-y-felin – insurance, utilities, rates and so on – but with no income from usage to cover those costs.

We have explored finding a partner organisation – like

an outdoor learning company or charity – which might operate Ty'n-y-felin on behalf of the school and the Lymm Grammar School Trust but have drawn a blank so far.

We now welcome ideas and suggestions from everyone interested in Ty'n-yfelin about what we should do next. If there is a lot of interest, we'll organise a meeting at Lymm High School to hear ideas and views.

Year 8 student Sonya Kladko represented Ukraine at the Eurovision Song Concert when she danced on stage with Rita Ora.

The student performed a solo dance routine with a red ball at the Eurovision semi-final. She then walked hand-in-hand with the pop star at the M&S Bank Arena in Liverpool.

It is estimated that an average of 2.3 million viewers watched the semi-final, which aired on BBC One on Tuesday 9th May.

The 12-year-old student (who's real name is Sofiia) is from Rivne in the north west of Kyiv. She's been living in Lymm since arriving in the UK last year. into Year 8 at Lymm High", said Mrs Wagstaff. "We are all so proud of her performance." Sonya's mum, Ira, is also part of the Lymm High community as she works within the Catering team.

"Sonya has been such a huge asset to our school since she joined us in June 2022 from Ukraine", said Miss Dixon. "She has thrown herself completely into her academic studies and extracurricular participation, and is an absolute pleasure to have in class." "We are so proud of Sonya performing with Rita Ora at Eurovision 2023 – she gave such a phenomenal performance!"

During the Eurovision show, Rita Ora delivered a medley of her past hits and was later joined by 54 backing dancers, including 30 from the Liverpool Institute for Performing Arts (Lipa).

Shortly before going on stage, Rita Ora posted on Twitter paying tribute to Sonya as representing "strength and hope during these turbulent, tragic and changeable times".

"Sonya has settled really well

She added: "We must not forget the privilege the UK has to play its part as host nation at the Eurovision 2023 for the Ukraine after the Kalush Orchestra won the contest last year."

"The plight of Sofiia's family reminds me of the incredible journey my family went through when I was her age, and how I





will be forever grateful to the UK for showing us kindness and compassion", she added.

Rita Ora grew up in Kosovo and came to the UK with her family where she pursued her career in entertainment.

"Sofiia opens my performance this evening playing with a ball, representing the loss of childhood for these poor refugees."

"I hope this amazing song contest opens hearts across Europe and the world. We love you Ukraine, we all perform tonight, for you."

ECO REPS REAP REWARDS

Lymm High's Eco Committee is split into Biodiversity, Energy and Waste groups.

The students meet regularly to discuss how to make Lymm High's community – students, staff and parents/carers – more ecologically aware.

Environmentally-friendly, 'green' and resource-saving methods are discussed and implemented where possible.

The Biodiversity Eco Reps have been hard at work overseeing the planting of an orchard on the school grounds, near Spud Wood. They have also prepared





a flower bed next to one of the school yards ready for wildflowers to be planted. The plan is to do another four more flower beds in the Autumn.

Last year the Biodiversity team spent a day building a bug hotel on the back of the school field to increase the variety of local flora and fauna. This was made out of pallets, old bricks, dead leaves and foliage.

A bug hotel is an easy way to increase wildlife and support the natural environment around school.

The Energy Eco Reps started this year with three main aims and are making great headway:

- To reduce energy use
- To reduce energy waste
- To change mindsets

The school's lightbulbs are progressively being replaced with LED ones to reduce overall energy usage. In addition, passive infrared (PIR) sensors are now operational in Sixth Form areas. The heating system has also been refined and a new pool cover in the Leisure Centre is further helping school to save energy.

Some of the Energy Eco Reps have agreed to be 'Power Rangers' and will be reminding teachers at the end of Period 5 to switch off electrical devices and close windows. Quite a few of our electrical switches now feature a sticker saying 'Please switch me off'.

Further plans to reduce energy use are more longterm, and include solar panels, pipework insulation and electric-vehicle charging points.

The aim to change mindsets and encourage all to

think greener is being accomplished via social media messages, assemblies, student interaction and bulletins.

The Waste Eco Reps are investigating options for the recycling of food, paper, batteries, plastic bottles and books at school. Ideas for recycling stations around school are being looked into, and teachers will be encouraged to recycle by having dedicated boxes in their classrooms.

The recycling of school uniform and sports kit is another project for the Waste Eco Reps. Secondhand items are now available in the school shop.

VISITING ARTIST: IAN MURPHY

The Visual Arts Department welcomed artist Ian Murphy into school for a full day mixed media workshop on Thursday 27th April.

lan Murphy is a contemporary British Fine Artist who gained initial success with selection to the British Young Contemporary Artists in 1985. He is best known for his powerful, tonal drawings and atmospheric, mixed media oil paintings of architectural places. The workshop was open to all students in Years 10 and 12 currently studying Fine Art at GCSE or A' Level as well as students in Year 9 who have chosen Fine Art as one of their GCSE options next year.

The workshop ran in the main hall, allowing plenty of space for students to work on multiple pieces at one time, a key process of Murphy's practice. The workshop explored various application methods using mixed media. Students had the chance to experiment with a range of materials such as white tissue paper, newspaper, coloured inks and graphite powder. Time was also spent exploring compositional drawing techniques to incorporate architectural details into the mixed media pieces.





"The day was very exciting and fast paced, and all students remained fully engaged throughout the day", said Miss Simms. "This allowed them to create some fantastic pieces."

The standard of work produced was very impressive. Having the opportunity to view Ian Murphy's sketchbooks and Iarge-scale pieces up close was a priceless experience for both staff and students, along with asking him any questions about his work or becoming a full time artist.

CHESHIRE CHAMPIONS!

Our Year 9 girls football team has excelled in both the National Cup and the Cheshire Cup this season with some outstanding performances and some thrilling victories along the way.

Non more so than the Cheshire Cup Final, which was hosted by Middlewich Town FC. The girls made an explosive start going up 3–0, only to surrender that lead just after half time, conceding three quick goals to make it 3–3 with only 10 minutes to go. It was high drama right to the end and suitably a superb team goal won the game 5–4 in the final few minutes.

This team has been a real credit to the school this year. They have always conducted themselves perfectly and consistently demonstrated passion, determination and resilience in each and every game.

They reached the final 16 in the country in the National Cup, narrowly losing to Haslingden High School in a very tense game.

Their route to the final in the Cheshire Cup was outstanding, beating hugely respectable opposition such as Bishop Heber, Ellesmere Port and an amazing 6–0 win at Leftwich, which saw them play Wilmslow in the final.

The victory secured this trophy for the second time and has helped inspire even more girls to join a well-established and successful girls football programme here at Lymm.
