You may recall from the last [Alumni newsletter](#), that Tom Dykes got in touch about Dennis Thomason's photographs from the 1950s that we used in our [Winter 2023/24 newsletter](#) (page 14).

FESTIVE SPIRIT

Our last term of 2025 was themed 'Kindness' and our students once again showed incredible generosity and Christmas kindness.



Our Key Stage 3 students (Years 7–9) collected an amazing 172 Christmas shoeboxes for the Manchester Street Angels appeal – the highest number the school has ever achieved!

The campaign invited students to create gift-filled boxes for a wide range of recipients. From pamper boxes for the elderly, to fun-filled parcels for children, to even special boxes for dogs, the students made sure no one was left out this festive season.

"Staff and students alike were delighted – and admittedly a

little astonished – when the final count reached 172 shoeboxes", said Head of Art Mrs Taylor, who organised the collection. "This sets a brand-new school record and has spread excitement throughout the school community."

The Manchester Street Angels team expressed heartfelt gratitude for the donation, which will go directly to supporting vulnerable individuals and families across Greater Manchester.

Key Stage 4 (Years 10 and 11) and Sixth Form students clubbed together as Forms to provide gifts for local charities.

Once again Lymm High supported Warrington Youth Zone (WYZ) and Mission Christmas. Nuvvy Sibia from WYZ assisted with Lymm High's collection and redirected the gifts to areas most in need. He said: "A MASSIVE thank you to your students for thinking of others, at a time of year which can be so incredibly difficult for so many families".





POPPIES GALORE

This year, the Visual Arts department created its biggest Remembrance Day display yet!

Students from all year groups donated hundreds of egg cartons, which were transformed into bright red poppies spread across the school. In the Atrium space, there were hundreds of poppies hanging from above, making the space feel calm and thoughtful. In the Link Gallery, there was a huge curtain of poppies, and in the Lower Hex a tall pillar of poppies stood proudly.

These displays help students to remember the soldiers who fought in the past and those who continue to serve today. Remembrance Day is an important time to think about their bravery and the sacrifices they made to keep us safe. "Creating these poppy installations is a lovely way to show respect. It also reminds us that by working together, even with something as simple as egg cartons, we can make something beautiful and meaningful", said Miss Simms.



LYMM REMEMBERS

The History faculty once again partnered with Lymm Heritage Centre to investigate the story of local soldiers from Lymm who served and died in the First World War.



This story was added to the Remembrance display in the Atrium, which was bedecked by poppies (see p. 5). The story helped students to focus on a testimony of a local soldier when participating in the 2-minute silence at school, whilst gaining a greater understanding of their local history. This year's tragic story is of the **Appleton Brothers** from Statham.

Samuel Appleton was born in Hollins Green in 1833 but moved to Lymm when it was still a boat ride away across the river Mersey. He had married a Lymm girl, with a Lymm name, Ann Brazendale. Ann was already a Fustian Cutter and that was the trade that Samuel Appleton took up on Narrow Lane, now Oldfield Road in Statham. Somehow Samuel ended up as master of his own Fustian workshop there.

One of his sons, Thomas, married Ann Ball whose father ran the Shop and Post Office in Statham (the house is still there today and can be seen in the photo overleaf).

Thomas and Ann had eight children, not unusual at the time. There were six sons, the two youngest were George and Sydney. Both were a credit to their parents. George had gained employment in a Solicitor's office, quite something for a lad from his background, while young Sydney was a popular local Postman.

Both were stalwart members of the Primitive Methodist Church on Eagle Brow, where George was even the secretary of the Sunday School. George was a keen gymnast too and regularly attended the Statham Lads Club.

However, the even tenor of their ways was abruptly shaken by war. They were only 18 and 16, respectively, when the First World War broke

out. Both answered the call to enlist and serve their country, George first and Sydney a little later. Tragically neither would return home.

George rose to the rank of Lance-Sergeant before he was killed by a sniper's bullet in August 1915. This was a terrible shock for the family but worse was yet to come. In 1917, Sydney also lost his life at the tender age of just 19 years leaving the whole neighbourhood grieving.

Two lives cruelly cut short and a family left shattered. We will remember them.

BROTHERS IN ARMS



STATHAM FAMILY STRUCK BY DOUBLE TRAGEDY

The well known Appleton family of Statham who run the local shop and post office have now been struck by the loss of not one but two sons during fighting at the front in the Great War.

Lance-Sergeant George Appleton 1894-1915

George was a committed member of the Methodist church on Eagle Brow. He was also a gymnast and a footballer. He survived a terrible bombardment in Flanders but was tragically killed by a German sniper on 24th August 1915 aged 21 years.

Rifleman Sydney Appleton 1898-1917

Family, friends and neighbours were left in shock at the tragic news of the death of Sydney Appleton aged 19 younger brother of George who was killed in 1915. A member of the Methodist Church and a popular postman he will be greatly missed.

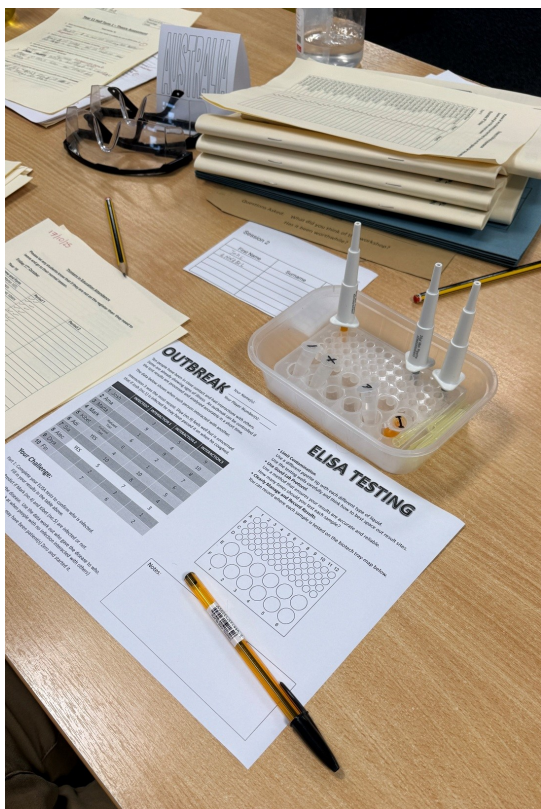
SCHOLARS BREAK GLOBAL STEM RECORDS

Students in Years 8–11 took part in a series of Thinkers in Education STEM workshops, designed to stretch their scientific understanding, teamwork and problem-solving skills under pressure.



The sessions challenged students to think critically and creatively while competing against thousands of students from across the world.

Years 8 and 9 took on *CSI: Body in the Box*, analysing DNA and crime scene evidence to solve a missing person case. One of the Year 9 teams – achieved an outstanding result, setting a new Key Stage 3 world record in a workshop that has seen over 4700 competitors take part globally. One of our students also joined a very select group of students to achieve 100% in the final quiz, marking her as one of the top individual performers worldwide.



One of the Year 8 teams also impressed, setting a new record in the observation and deduction round and narrowly missing out on the overall win.

Students in Years 10 and 11 participated in *Medical Science: Pandemic*, investigating ways to prevent future pandemics and tracing the source of the Ebola virus. A Year 11 team set a new global record with 105,044 points, surpassing all previous scores from more than 10,000 students worldwide. This includes those in Years 12, 13, and even first-year university students from Oxford and Cambridge!

Workshop leaders praised our students for their focus, collaboration and resilience, commenting that their performance outshone that of many prestigious independent schools. These achievements demonstrate the exceptional scientific thinking and teamwork shown by our students, placing them among the top-performing young scientists on the global stage.

HALL TOGETHER

The draw for our online raffle took place on Friday 12th December and it was a huge success!

We'd like to offer huge thanks to all the parents, carers and friends of Lymm High who bought tickets for the raffle. Two of our alumni also very kindly donated some funds to help. Thanks to this, we raised over £5000 for our 'Hall Together' Main Hall transformation project. A fantastic result!

In all, we had 421 entrants and 3136 tickets were issued. All of the lucky winners have now been informed.

As you can see, the Main Hall is already looking so much better! We now have LED lights that can be adapted to the colour of the Hall Assembly (Arley, Dunham, Moreton, Tatton or Walton), which the students think are great! The next improvement will be the installation of a new Trophy cabinet.

We are planning an exciting event in the Spring term, which will highlight our new-look Hall.

TYNNY UPDATE



Good progress is being made on the cottage at Ty'n-y-Felin.

The new roof, including guttering, is now in place, just in time before the weather turned! Solar panels have also been installed to both sides. The render on the external walls has been hacked off and the first scratch coat has been applied ready for the final topcoat finish. New windows are also being installed with Welsh slate cills.

Internally, some of the walls have been rebuilt because of not being structurally sound. In addition, damp proofing has been completed, new insulation installed and electrics fitted.

Lymm High was rooting for two of its ex-students at the World Rowing Championships in September 2025.

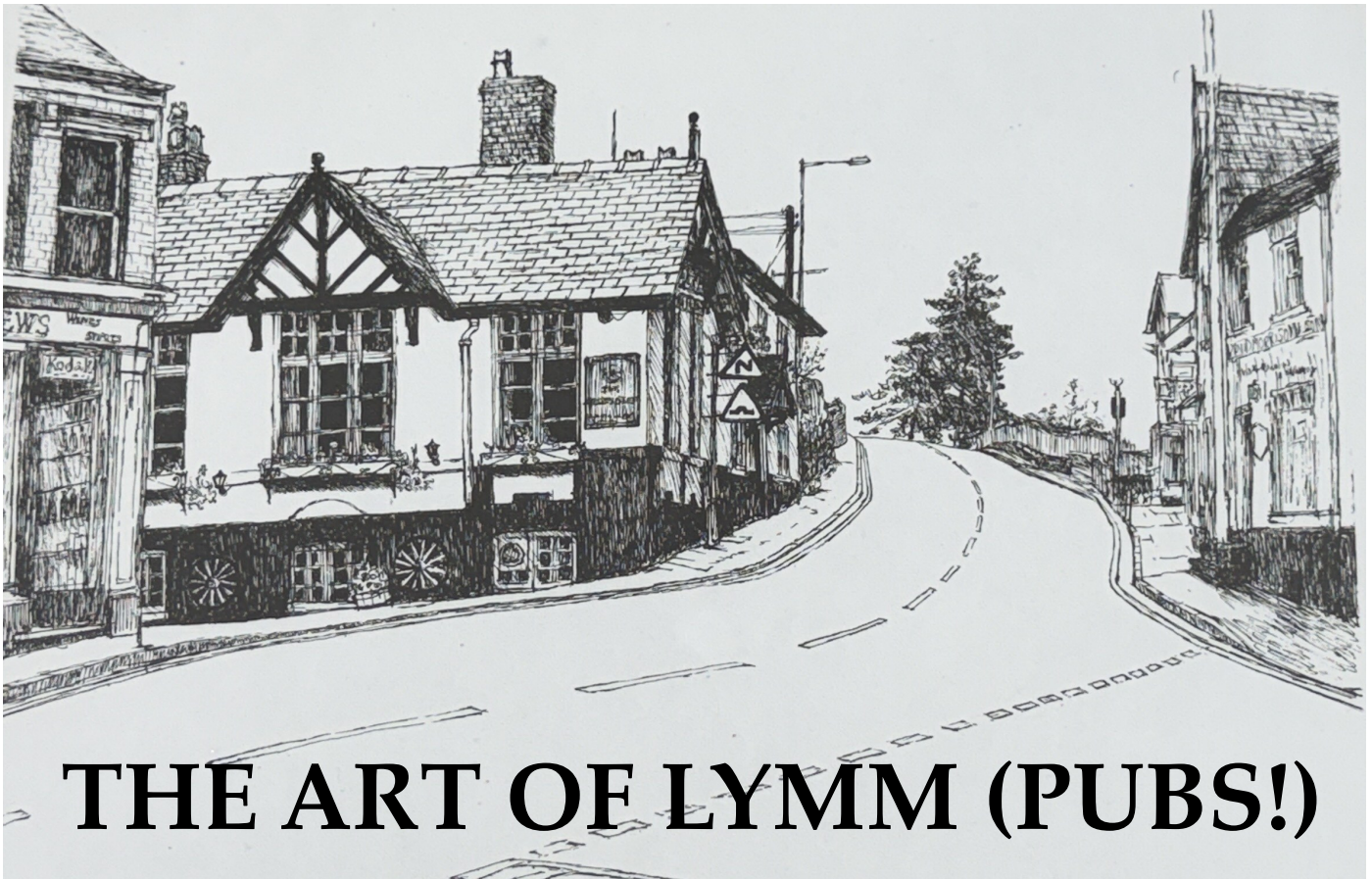
Lucy Glover and Cam Nyland represented Great Britain in Shanghai, China, at the World Rowing Championships in the women's double sculls.

Featuring almost 900 athletes from 56 nations, the championships included 23 boat classes over 8 days of action from 21–28th September.

In the second heat of the women's double sculls, Lucy and Cam finished 5th. They then went on to compete in the event's B final, finishing 11th overall.

As well as both attending Lymm High School (1 year apart), Lucy and Cam both started their international careers at Warrington Rowing Club.

I left Lymm High School in 2020 and went on to study Chemical Engineering with a Year in Industry at the University of Sheffield, graduating with a Master's Degree and First-Class Honours. My career has been relatively short, but I am proud of what I have achieved so far. I am now a recognised Associate Member of the Institution of Chemical Engineers (IChemE) and a STEM Ambassador.

From the age of 14, I worked at Sexton's Village Bakery in Lymm village. I continued working there throughout my studies at Lymm and university, for a total of near enough 9 years. Working at Sexton's taught me confidence, discipline, and how to be a mindful and reliable team member. These skills have been invaluable in every role I have taken on since.

In September 2022, I gained my first experi-

ence on an industrial site with Core Additive Technologies, taking part in a 10-day industrial cleaning of an alkylation unit at Phillips 66 Humber Refinery. This gave me the chance to apply what I had been learning at university and gave me a sense of realism that I had been craving up until that point. During this period, I also completed my CCNSG certification, demonstrating that I had the required competency to work on a live industrial site.

During my industrial year in July 2023, I worked as a Student Process Engineer at Hart Process Services (HPS), a small process consultancy, for a total of 14 months. The role provided me with hands-on experience on real projects and responsibilities that I might not have had at a larger company. I got the chance to go on site visits and work on many

projects in the food/drink, energy and water sectors. It was a fantastic opportunity to build technical knowledge, professionalism and teamwork skills.

Since September 2025, I have been working as a Graduate Design HSE Engineer with Costain, near Manchester Airport. So far, I have had the opportunity to lead the creation of Dangerous Substances and Explosive Atmospheres Regulations (DSEAR) reports for a water sector client. I am excited to continue growing as an engineer and leader at Costain, a company that values developing its graduates.

Outside of work life, I still live in Lymm and enjoy playing for the local amateur football team, Lymm AFC, which has a strong community of Lymm High Alumni. I also play for a local darts team.

She is surely one to watch for the future."

U13 CRICKET SELECTION

Seb Jones has been selected to play for England's U13s Indoor Cricket team and travelled to India over the October half-term break to take part in an international competition.

The Year 7 student and his England U13s teammates did exceptionally well and won the tournament in Bangalore for the England Indoor Cricket team.

Seb has loved the experience and will now stay in the England Emerging Players Pathway for training with the potential of World Cup selection for September 2026 in South Africa.





Year 13 student Ben Ross crossed the Yangtze River during the summer holiday.

Following a very long flight to China, and still feeling the effects of jet lag, there was very little rest for the Sixth Form student before all contenders had to compete in the qualifying event. Only the top 40 males (and 30 females for the women's race) were then eligible to tackle the swim.

Fortunately, Ben made the cut so could relax for a day, be taken on a river cruise to see the course, see some sights and have a short practice swim before the main race.

On the day of the race, there was

an opening ceremony, followed by press photos and interviews.

Up against Olympians and World Medalists, 37.6°C heat at 7am, strong, unpredictable currents, Ben put in a strong performance to cross the river (approximately 1800m). He made it in 13 minutes, finishing 19th, which was within prize-money rankings. Many competitors failed to cross as the current pulls them down the river and they are then collected by boats waiting vigilantly.

This was a phenomenal experience and a tremendous achievement.

GCSE AND A'LEVEL RESULTS

Students and staff celebrated excellent exam results over the summer.

First up was A' Level Results Day on Thursday 14th August 2025. School opened early so that the nervous wait could be over as soon as possible, and students entered Sixth Form at 8am.

The Lower Hex was soon filled with excitement, and students and staff celebrated another excellent set of post-16 results.

Amongst the many highlights, Laam Chow secured an incredible four straight A* grades, closely followed by Sofia Ottiwell, Jamie Lo, Novi Ma and

Charlotte Masters, all of whom picked up three A* grades or equivalent.

There are so many other students who have also done exceptionally well, including some who have had to overcome some really tough personal challenges along the way.

"We are delighted for all of them", said Mr Williams.

"Amidst all the smiles and celebrations, it's easy to forget how much work sits behind the success students have had", he

said. Post-16 qualifications these days are really challenging and require a great deal of sustained hard work and commitment, not to mention perseverance and determination.

Mrs Neesam, Head of Sixth Form, said: "I'm so pleased for the students and am feeling very proud of them. It's been my first year as Head of Sixth Form here and I've been so impressed by them ever since I arrived; as well as having great attitudes towards their studies,

they are such a lovely group of people and I've really enjoyed working with them. They deserve all the success that has come their way this morning."

Many students are now heading off to top universities around the country and others are beginning exciting apprenticeship options.

Following the A' Level results, the next week GCSE students lined up to get their results on Thursday 21st August. And once again, they were superb!

Mr Williams said: "We are delighted with our GCSE performance again this year. The Year 11 cohort have been wonderful throughout their time at the school, and we are so pleased that these results will set them up so well for whatever steps they are taking next. All the smiles we've seen this morning on the faces of the students are thoroughly well-deserved – as indeed are the smiles on the faces of all the parents and

carers who have provided such brilliant support."

"Although we've become quite used to seeing such strong results over the past few years, we try very hard to avoid any complacency. It's therefore really pleasing to see the success continuing and to know that these results will keep us right at the top in terms of performance across the North West."

What is especially positive again is the consistency of the results. The headlines are certainly very impressive, but Lymm High staff are even more pleased with

what sits behind them. All the bigger subjects have performed exceptionally well, as have students from all groups and different academic starting points.

"This kind of profile of results only comes about as a result of sustained hard work and I thank and congratulate everyone involved", said Mr Williams.

87% of students managed to secure grades 4 and above in both English and Maths, with 69% securing 5 or above in both key subjects. Fully 33% scored grade 7 or above in both. In fact, well over 40% of all GCSE grades came in at grade 7 or higher.
